

LETTER FROM JAMIE VAN LEEUWEN

Listen Think. Act.

The Global Livingston Institute (GLI) turned 10 this year. Fond memories were revisited of student groups taking their first trip with me to Uganda and Rwanda with passports and cash all stowed away in my backpack and no idea what all 18 of us were going to eat or where we were going to stay when we arrived in Northern Uganda. Old pictures of a scraggly goatee that I tried to grow surfaced this year, along with clips of 150 local Ugandans building the Entusi Resort and Retreat Center (Entusi) by hand in 2012 based on architectural designs rendered on the back of a Nile Special beer napkin. True to our brand we spent the first decade of our existence listening and thinking. What we learned together – from Kampala to Colorado – was how to transform community. And let me tell you, we are just getting started! For the 2,000 travelers who have participated in our immersion programs, the hundreds of former abductees we have trained as farmers, the 29 academic partnerships we have built, the 40 Ugandans we employ to manage our day-to-day operations, the 65 women in our Entusi Women's Association, the hundreds of women around the globe who have participated in our Women's Leadership Retreats, and the 250,000 Ugandans and Rwandans who have shown up at our HIV prevention music festivals... this is not your grandma's NGO!

With the only intention being to engage with communities in East Africa without feeling the need to "fix" them, 18 students from the University of Denver left Colorado for Uganda. Since then, we've engaged thousands of students and interns from more than 20 universities in this same educational exercise, asking them to listen, think and act with us.

Word travels fast in Denver. Following the success of the inaugural 2009 student trip, we began taking working professionals on "community leader" trips. Hundreds of people representing the public, private and nonprofit sectors have since joined us in East Africa where they've engaged with their counterparts in dialogue, built their networks and rethought how to approach social issues globally – including in their own communities.

As we continued to grow, 150 local workers came together with 18 full-time Ugandan staff to build Entusi, which now hosts thousands of people from GLI and beyond each year. Constructed on a peninsula on Lake Bunyonyi in southwestern Uganda, Entusi was intended to house the remarkable conversations that were taking place on our trips, yet it has become so much more. It embodies our mission to encourage people to engage in thoughtful dialogue before addressing complex issues.

Entusi hosted its first conference before it was officially open to the public – with half a roof, no hot water and mostly finished accommodations. The first annual Women's Leadership Retreat brought together women from across cultures and sectors to engage in dialogue, tell stories and build lasting and supportive relationships. In June 2020, we'll host our eighth annual Women's Leadership Retreat.



In partnership with College Track and City Year, our first group of high school students from the United States visited East Africa. During their trip, we connected them with secondary school





students from all over East Africa for the first annual Entusi Youth Summit. 95% of the high school students who participate in this program receive scholarship support and would otherwise be unable to access enriching international educational opportunities.

2014 was a big year. We also partnered with Reach A Hand Uganda to launch what would become the iKnow Concert Series. Over the years, 250,000 people have attended these shows, and 30,000 have received a free HIV test. We've helped produce concerts in six Ugandan cities. Music brings people together on equal footing better than anything else, and that's what we're all about.



DSST (formerly Denver School of Science and Technology) and GLI teamed up to build a global classroom. Together, we developed curricula for two annual trips with faculty and students focused on conservation and social entrepreneurship. Over the past five years, we've fundraised to provide scholarship support to 100% of the students who have participated in these programs.

Our music initiatives expanded into Rwanda. Capitalizing on public interest in the Tour du Rwanda – the second largest cycling race on the continent – we produced "finish line" public health concerts in two Rwandan communities, with a third added in February 2020.



With the partnership and support of the Sanders Family Philanthropic Foundation, we launched our workforce development program in Uganda. Since then, the program has provided more than 2,000 people – ranging from urban youth to women farmers in post-conflict communities – with training and support aimed at income improvement. Of those who completed a follow-up survey, 94% reported increasing their incomes after their participation.

Michael Franti and Spearhead headlined our sixth annual iKnow Concert Series in Uganda, including a special concert celebrating International Women's Day. We also produced GLI's 20th concert on World AIDS Day with our first-ever concert in the fishing community of Hoima, which has an HIV rate among the highest in Uganda.

2019 also saw unprecedented efforts to bring the "GLI magic" home to Colorado. Ugandan superstar Navio and Michael Franti rocked a sold-out Red Rocks Amphitheatre after meeting – and recording together – in Uganda. They reunited at Denver's Bluebird Theatre later in the year to celebrate GLI's 10th anniversary (another sellout!). When you bring together superstars across cultures, amazing things start to happen.




